

ASHP Accredited PGY-2 Emergency Medicine Pharmacy Residency

The primary focus of the residency is to become an emergency department pharmacist capable of working independently and collaboratively with the emergency medicine team to care for adult and pediatric emergency medicine patients at a level 1, academic medical center.

Stipend/Benefits:	\$47,500; 144 hours of paid time off (PTO), inclusive of vacation, holidays and sick time, during each year of the residency program. Residents receive travel funds and registration for professional meetings and selected certificate programs.

Strengths

PGY2 Emergency Medicine Residency structure

- Resident will complete rotational experience in primarily adult patient populations with two rotations in the pediatric population (Pediatric Intensive Care Unit and Pediatric Emergency Department)
- Required rotations are generally four weeks in length with longitudinal rotations of 12 months
- Elective rotations are typically four weeks but may vary in length based on resident and rotational needs
- Residents will be able to select at least two elective rotations, but no more than three
- There are seven required EM rotations and three required ICU rotations

Required four-week EM rotations

- Orientation to the PGY2 Emergency Medicine Pharmacy Residency (resident is oriented to Emergency Department workflows, institutional requirements and the residency)
- Emergency Medicine Adult – EM Basics
- Emergency Medical Service and Pre-Hospital Focus
- Emergency Medicine Pediatric/Nights
- Emergency Medicine – Trauma
- Emergency Medicine – Community Practice
- Emergency Medicine – Teaching

Required ICU rotations

- Pediatric Intensive Care Unit
- Medical Intensive Care Unit/Surgical Intensive Care Unit
- One of the following ICU rotations must be selected as a required rotation:
- Neuro ICU or Cardiology/Cardiac ICU

Longitudinal rotations

- Clinical Management rotation – 12 months
- Longitudinal Emergency Medicine Pharmacy Practice Experience (staffing) – 12 months
- Longitudinal Education/Teaching/ Drug Information – 12 months
- Longitudinal Major Research Project – 12 months
- Advising – 12 months

Elective rotations

- Infectious Disease for Critically Ill Patients/Antimicrobial Stewardship
- Toxicology at the Wisconsin Poison Center in Milwaukee, WI
- Psychiatry
- Any other available elective offered at University of Wisconsin pertaining to the resident's areas of interest

- Major project will be presented at regional or national pharmacy or emergency medicine meeting
